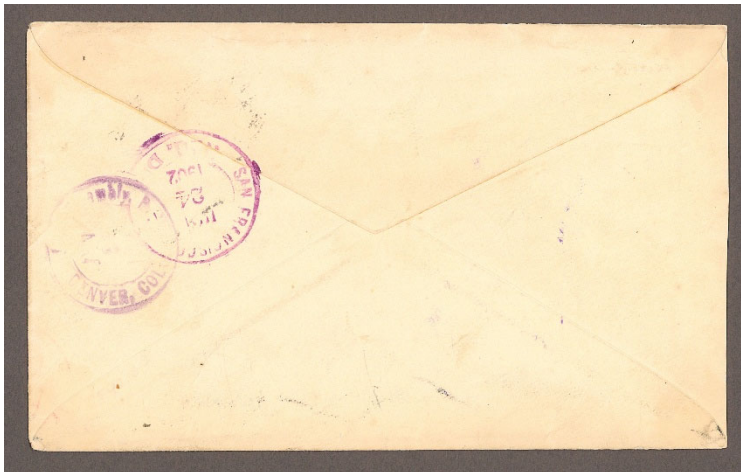

Overview

This registered cover represents an exceptional philatelic artifact from the turn of the 20th century, mailed by the prominent stamp dealer E. F. Gambs from San Francisco, California, to L. C. Nelson in Denver, Colorado. Sent on June 24, 1902, the item utilizes a 5 cents Columbian commemorative stamped envelope from 1892, upgraded a decade later with 1 cent, 2 cents, and 4 cents values from the celebrated 1901 Pan-American Exposition issue. The reverse side features the corresponding purple San Francisco registry postmark and a distinct Denver receiving backstamp dated June 27, 1902, tracing its complete 3-day transit across the American West.

Postal Rate

The total franking on this postal cover equals exactly 12 cents, which represents a combination of the 5 cents printed value of the Columbian stamped envelope and 7 cents in added Pan-American adhesive stamps. During this postal era, the domestic first-class letter rate was 2 cents per half ounce, and the registry fee was a flat 8 cents. This cover perfectly satisfies the mathematical calculation for a double-weight domestic registered letter, where

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the first 2 ounces of weight required 4 cents of postage, combined with the mandatory 8 cents registry fee to total exactly 12 cents.

Condition

The cover exhibits a well-preserved appearance with clean paper stock and sharp strikes of the registration markings. The adhesive stamps are securely affixed with minor edge wear, and the embossed envelope indicia remains crisp. Light toning is present along the perimeter, and a minor vertical fold line exists on the left side, which does not impact the stamps or key cancellations.

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
